To be followed on BOTH planned strike days (27th April and 2nd May)

Please check on each Google Classroom stream to see if there is any information from each of your subject teachers as follows:

- 1) Please check at the start of every lesson on your timetable to see if your teacher is running a lesson online via Google Meet – if they are, that is what you do.
- 2) If a lesson is not being run on Google Meet, please next check to see if any of your teachers have set work for you to do. If they have, please complete that. If you finish early look at the activities below:
- 3) If none of the above are in place or you finish the work set, the following activities listed below cover a 5 hour school day and can be completed in any order. Use any time left over on activities below – there are 6 activities so you can choose which ones you complete in the time you have left. We have set 5 of these activities so that they can be done even if you do not have internet access.
 - One hour reading a book of your choice
 - 30 minutes to one hour doing some form of physical activity – try a Joe Wicks session if you have internet access!
 - One hour to write a letter to family member or friend
 - One hour to watch a documentary/educational programme on a topic of your choice
 - One hour on Hegarty maths
 - Look back to the start of Year 7 for one of your subjects and write revision notes on what you have covered
