Task D: Practice some A level Geography!

There are three synoptic themes across the A level. The synoptic themes incorporate specialist geographical concepts, namely

- 1. Players
- 2. Attitudes and Actions
- 3. Futures and Uncertainties.

When we study each topic you will need to identify the following:

Players

- Those responsible for making decisions about people and the use of space, and how these decisions are implemented.
- Players may be categorised into three sectors: public, private, and voluntary.

Attitudes and Actions

Attitudes—the viewpoints that decision-makers and stakeholders have towards
economic, social, environmental or political issues; Attitudes are important, because
players with certain attitudes towards one issue (e.g. pro-globalisation) may have
similar views towards other issues (e.g. anti-climate change) due to shared interests
(making profit).

 Their actions—the ways in which they try to achieve what they want. E.g. not all tensions and conflict are resolved through military action. How might a 'soft' approach have more influence? Etc.

Futures and Uncertainties

Different players approach questions about the future differently.

- Visions include: •'Business as usual', i.e. letting things function as they are –such as 'do nothing', or doing what's necessary when it's unavoidable. E.g. increasing global temperatures.
- Or more sustainable strategies, e.g. radical action in managing climate change. For example –with energy, such should governments play a bigger role in decisionmaking about energy futures, by encouraging pro-renewable energy policies?

Read the following articles. On a slide- identify each of the key themes. You are encouraged to find other articles, videos, sources to help you. Then do the stretch!

Challenge

1. Water wars: Ethiopia Vs Egypt

Things to think about:

- Who are the key players, are there more than 2?
- What are the attitudes around Ethiopia's right to building the Dam and Egypt's growing frustrations and militarisation around the issue.
- What Actions are each party taking's anyone else involved, what role have they played.
- What concerns are there around the future of the Nile and around the building of the Ethiopian Dam? What does this future look like for Egypt Vs Ethiopia?
- What are the risks and benefits for their people, governments and environment?

Now do the same for the other two articles.
